# Letter to the Community

Dear Friends,

The year 2022 both in Haiti and for Haiti Outreach, as for much of the world, was indeed very mixed. The good news was that COVID had been reduced to a minor problem, and for Haiti Outreach, we celebrated our 25th Anniversary!! More on that to follow elsewhere in this report.

However, for the country of Haiti, the political chaos and lawlessness, especially in the capital Port-au-Prince, developed even worse than the year before, when in 2021 the President was assassinated and an earthquake occurred weeks later. Here is why. The Prime Minister did not call for new elections, not only for the presidency, but also for the houses of parliament. He was therefore essentially ruling by himself, and without any other authority. The army was abolished twenty years earlier, and the capital only had a minor police force to protect the population, which is very inadequate against violent gangs who seized control and realized they could kidnap people for money and charge money to control neighborhoods and many city streets with their superior guns. It's all about power and money that the gangs now control over half of the capital with no one to stop them.

What's more they cut off access to refined gasoline and diesel fuel for about 4 months in 2022, paralyzing transportation and therefore most commerce causing massive shortages and hyper-inflation throughout the country. Haiti Outreach could do very little during that time, as we need fuel to operate. Finally, the gangs decided to allow fuel to be transported again in the country, but to this day are controlling and taxing it.

Nevertheless, despite all these difficulties, Haiti Outreach continued our important community development work with the focus on clean water and sanitation. Some of our highlights included:

- Progress was made in partnership with HANWASH in the commune of Cavaillon with Rotary Global Grants that included more wells and work on the town water system.

- Great progress was also made with HANWASH and Rotary Global Grant support on the town water system in Pignon. Soon it will provide water to homes and shops in Pignon with a pressurized system operating 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- Preliminary work was done in the commune of Ferrier to prepare the commune for a new water system; with sanitation education, latrines were being built for all the homes so that it would become open defecation free for the first time!
- Pan American Development Foundation provided Haiti Outreach with funding for promoting hygiene and sanitation in the schools of the commune of Pignon. One school in particular has taken this on seriously, forming a student/parent/school committee to charge a little extra for school fees and hire someone to clean and stock needed water for handwashing, toilet paper and tampons so the children keep sanitary. This is something we take for granted in the U.S. but is very rare in Haiti.
- We completed additional community managed wells in the communes of Arcahaie, Cabaret, San Raphael, Capotille and Ferrier.

We hope and pray that 2023 will bring greater peace and stability in Haiti, and perhaps finally bring an end to the chaos in the capital. We also hope and pray we will be able to continue this life saving work, thanks to the generosity and commitment of so many of our donors and supporters. We are extremely grateful to all of you!

# Haiti Outreach Gala Celebrates 25 years of Accomplishments

Not only did the people in attendance celebrate, but we also hired a team to broadcast our celebration over the internet to anyone who could "tune in" online, including a special group in Chicago that some of our board members who live there put together.

Board Chair Saurel Quettan flew up from Atlanta to be our MC for the evening. Community Development Director Roge Michel, who has been with us for over 20 years, and Co-founder and Country Director Neil Van Dine both flew from Haiti to participate in this special event. Neil had most of his family with him, including his wife, many children, and his father who flew in from Maine.

Co-founder and Executive Director Dale Snyder spoke about how we got started and photos were shown of our early days back in the 1990's, some of which are shown here. We had three video testimonials that were taken of Tif Alexius, current board member, Rachel Thibault, an early supporter, volunteer and board member, and James Adamson, principal of Northwater International who has worked on engineering projects with us since he was in his 20's.

The celebration centered around what we have accomplished in the last 25 years, which is summarized in the photo shown on this page. Not listed but presented at the Gala was our recent work on the Cavailon and Pignon town water systems, plus our work on a WASH in schools

Now we are partners on many projects leveraging even more support for this important work.

# The Community of Chiffonette Is Safer Now

The community of Chiffonette used to rely on a spring called Guerant as their primary water source. It was not only where many of the local people got water to drink, but also is considered to be a magical place of worship for some groups that practice voodoo. The voodoo ceremonies have impeded many members of the Chiffonette community from accessing the stream to gather water.

One morning, some of the children went to Guerant to fetch water. While they were filling their jerry cans, a man who was performing the ceremony started to verbally and physically harass one of the children to prevent him from drawing water from the source. The children fled and returned home without any water for their families for that day.

In response to the event, several parents in the area had a meeting to discuss the situation and develop a plan to ensure any women and children fetching water would be safe. They decided to send people in large groups so that no one would travel to the stream alone. While this was a good plan, it was not without problems. They still wanted a more viable solution.

One day, some people from the community found out about Haiti Outreach and its services. They requested a well for Chiffonette. A new well would allow them access to drinking water closer to home and eliminate harassment by the voodoo worshippers.

Richelieu Antoine is a husband, father of 6, pistachio farmer, and member of the Chiffonette community. He expressed, "I cried for joy and sincerely prayed that this would be accomplished quickly!" Three months after initiating the meetings and working hard to develop their management plan with the support of Haiti Outreach, local authorities, DINEPA, and the community, the community of Chiffonette celebrated the inauguration of their new well!



# Working Towards the Dream for Haiti

As of May 2022, the town of Cavaillon has received three new wells and had two rehabilitated. These wells service 218 households and 968 people. There are currently two more underway that should be inaugurated in June or July.

In response to the guidance from the Haiti Outreach animators during their water and sanitation training, a group of community leaders from Cavaillon assembled to reflect on how they could apply the changes their community had implemented on a broader scale. In January, they gathered to discuss their vision for a healthier Haiti. They recognized that this vision would require great collaboration, and the first step would be to meet with other leaders from the municipality of Cavaillon.

On March 5, 2022, different actors working in the municipality of Cavaillon such as: DINEPA, Rotary Club, the Mayor's office, city delegates, and the police, justice, and other local municipal leaders gathered to work towards this new dream. They had a lively discussion and determined that they would do whatever necessary to realize this vision of Cavaillon being a clean and healthy commune.

The plan is as follows: the Cavaillon health officer engages with the other sectors of the municipality in order to work together to clean it up. The goal of a "Clean and Healthy Commune" will be achieved when everyone has sustainable access to clean water, a designated latrine, and practices proper sanitation. Simple as this may sound to some from a more developed nation where running water from every faucet is a given, this assembly is a major step for Haiti's advancement towards becoming a developed nation.



# The Ripple Effects of our Training Model

Olan Théophile is a 55 year old peanut farmer who resides in Belvi, in the Northeast Department of Haiti. He has a wife, three children, and a 5 year old grand daughter. Before Haiti Outreach engaged his community, the primary water source for the community of Belvi came from a small natural spring called "Sous Kastel." This unprotected source emerges from behind the trunk of a tree that flows alongside the riverbank. The people of Belvi were not the only members of the community to gather water from Sous Kastel; the animals also used the river for drinking and bathing. During the rainy season, the waters would rise and cause a deluge which prevented people from accessing it for water.

One day, Olan was invited to take part in an important meeting. He learned that his community was working with an organization that would support his community in acquiring a clean water well in their area. At one of the following meetings, the community unanimously agreed to elect Olan as the guardian for their well. Initially, he was worried that the role would prohibit him from tending to his peanut garden, but his wife assured him that she would support him in his responsibilities. With her encouragement, he accepted the position.

Humbled and grateful for his new role, Olan shared, "I always did my best to attend all the training sessions. Thanks to those sessions, my management skills have improved. As a result, I have not only learned how to manage our well, but have applied this new knowledge to my own business. I have generated more profits which has allowed me to save and invest in improvements to my farm and home." Olan and his wife are working to set up a small grocery market in their community. This market will help his neighbors purchase their household needs closer to home and save them a long trek to the city center for basic supplies. Olan and his family are delighted by the ways a simple well has improved their lives in numerous ways.



# Good News for Commune of Cavaillon

HANWASH\* is a valuable partner to us. We are aligned on the vision that everyone would have sustainable access to clean water. Thanks to their support, a global grant from Rotary International has been submitted to further develop rural water systems and proper understanding of healthy hygienic practices in Cavaillon, Haiti.

The plan for this grant is to help us further advance our Commune Action Plan in Cavaillon. Specifically, towards the engagement of 9 rural villages to improve their knowledge of proper hygienic practices. One target outcome for this grant is that at least 85% of the commune will understand and practice proper sanitation. Once this target is achieved, our team will work towards increasing clean water supply in the area. We will employ our standard plan of engaging communities in a 3–4-month management training to equip them to take responsibility for the well after it has been drilled and inaugurated.

In addition to procuring water systems for these 9 communities, this grant will also allow us to gather more data to better understand the regional aquifers. This information is vital towards not only ensuring that the water is safe for consumption, but also aids us in better forecasting future capacity for accessing water. We are very excited about the forward movement that this grant will permit us to accomplish.

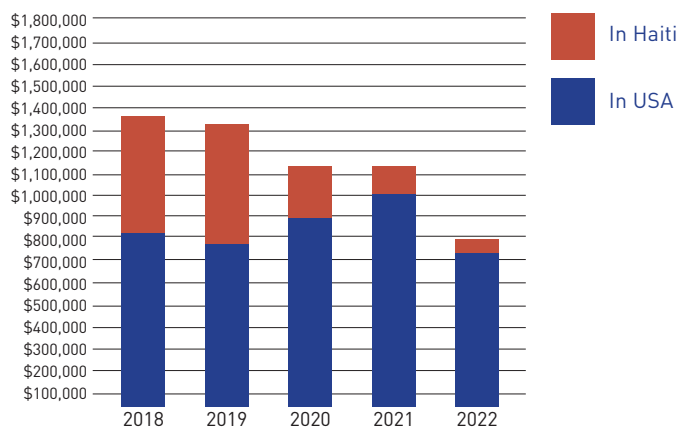

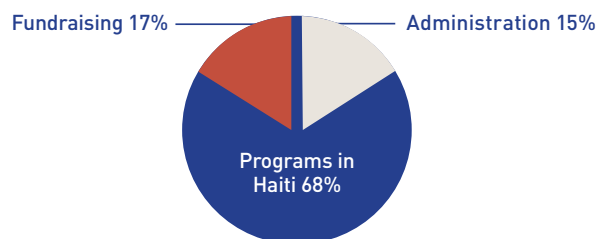
