



Haiti is one of the poorest and most under-developed countries in the world.

Rotary has already completed significant projects there to provide safe water and other sustainable services to the people of Haiti. Through partnerships with non-governmental organizations (NGO's) such as *Haiti Outreach*, Rotary is helping Haitians save lives and create a brighter long-term future for Haiti.

Formed in 2008, the "Rotary Partnership For Haiti" is a voluntary group of clubs from Minnesota, Wisconsin and Germany which came together in order to take on large projects in Haiti that clubs would not be able to address individually.

Funds were raised to build a public secondary school in the town of La Viktwa that opened in 2010! Now the partnership group hopes to expand with additional clubs and build another school to make a real, sustainable difference in the lives of many children in Haiti.

## The Need

Illiteracy is a significant problem in Haiti, where only 55% of the population can read or write and where there are public secondary schools for only 10% of students. The Central Plateau region of Haiti has a population of over 500,000 people, but has only four public secondary schools. Without schools, students are unable to continue education beyond the 6<sup>th</sup> grade.



To meet additional needs beyond Rotary's safe water program and to support real growth and sustainability, an educated population is critical for a brighter future in Haiti. Essential to this is providing opportunities to educate the youth of even the most remote regions of the country.

## The Opportunity

After we built the public secondary school in La Viktwa in 2010, the people in the neighboring town of Rankit have made a request to build a public secondary school in their town. They are eager and organized to have as many as 840 teenage students in 2 shifts at their own public school.



*Haiti Outreach* has now constructed three public schools in La Jeune, Pignon and La Viktwa. In their relationship with local community leaders, they have a solid understanding of the needs in the area and they know what it takes to get work accomplished in the country. *Haiti Outreach* is based in Minnesota and is managed by a Rotarian.

## FAQ's—Frequently Asked Questions

**Q: What are the schools like in Haiti and why is there such a need?**

**A:** Schools are available for only 62% of the elementary school students and only 18% of the secondary school students. Only 10% of Haiti's schools are public - the rest are private. Most people cannot afford private schools and the government has little resources to build schools.

**Q: Why was Rankit selected as the location?**

**A:** Rankit is about 10 miles from Haiti Outreach headquarters in Pignon and from the last school we built in La Viktwa. Leaders in Rankit have asked Haiti Outreach for help to build a public secondary school in their community, as the majority of families cannot afford to send their teenagers to private schools. There is a public primary in the town.

**Q: How large will the school be?**

**A:** The design is similar to other schools already built by Haiti Outreach, which is quite simple and made of concrete and steel. The design calls for seven classrooms, each with a capacity of up to 60 students.

This community says there will be enough interest to have 2 shifts of classes, so as many as 840 students will attend once it is completed,

**Q: The Haitian Government hasn't always been very stable. What impact does this have on the project?**

**A:** The people and government of Haiti respect the importance of education very much. Even in the most unstable times, the government has done what it can to pay the teachers and administrators to keep the schools open. There has never been any question by any faction or party that the education of their children has primary importance.

**Without schools, the Children of Haiti have little chance for a future!**
